When three organizations with deep roots in the Seattle community work together to combine their talents, resources and vision, a powerful partnership is born. Ronald Commons is the fruit of that collaboration. It is a new 60-unit mixed-use development in Shoreline at 178th Street that integrates affordable housing and support services to create a sense of place for low-income individuals and families.

A NEW HOME IN SHORELINE

To meet the needs of low-income and formerly homeless individuals and families in the Shoreline neighborhood of Seattle, Ronald Commons offers permanent, affordable housing and will allow residents to live in their apartments for as long as they choose.

The project includes renovation of the Ronald United Methodist Church (RUMC) and a mixed-use building with 60 units of affordable housing owned and operated by Compass Housing Alliance, and an integrated service center owned and operated by Hopelink. The service center includes a food bank and various programs that assist low-income households.

Half of the units will be rented to households who earn 30% or below the King County area median income, which for a family of four is \$26,460.

The other half will be rented to households who earn 50% or below the King County area median income, which for a family of four is \$44,100.

Potential residents will go through a pre-screening process to determine if they are eligible for affordable housing.

- 12 of the 60 units are set aside for formerly homeless families. These units are referred through King County Coordinated Entry Program.
- 3 of the 60 units are set aside for households with a developmentally disabled member. These units are referred through the King County Developmental Disabilities Division.
