Journey to Hope


Melvin's world was shattered at 14 when he lost his father. Without the skills or support to process his grief, he turned to substance abuse. Years of wandering from state to state followed, with no stable home. Briefly staying with relatives, it was clear he wasn't ready to settle.

Eventually, Melvin found himself homeless, lying on a tarp in the "middle of nowhere." As hope faded, a sudden inspiration struck him.

"Something told me that I didn't belong out here anymore," he reflects. "I needed to make a change. I've lived outside on and off for years, and something told me to come back to Compass Housing Alliance."

This impact report explores the comprehensive housing continuum of Compass Housing Alliance, offering support and stability to individuals like Melvin. His journey from despair to renewed hope showcases the transformative power of our mission and the crucial role Compass plays in rebuilding lives and communities.

In Providing **Emergency Services**

Compass Housing Alliance provides individuals currently living unsheltered with access to emergency and other critical services. Located in Pioneer Square, the Compass Multi-Service Center is a one-stop resource hub for individuals experiencing homelessness or housing instability, offering a range of essential services:

- Access to bathrooms and showers
- Free laundry services
- Three free meals a day
- Behavioral health support
- Personal mail

Our EMERGENCY SERVICES

The Compass Center is more than just a physical space, it's a lifeline to thousands of individuals each year.

These fundamental services create a foundation for our guests to rebuild their lives, fostering stability, growth, and a sense of belonging.

The Compass Center stands as a one-stop shop full of resources for folks experiencing homelessness or housing instability. Through our three vital programs, we provide essential services like:

- · mail services,
- case management,
- · shelter and housing referrals,
- showers and laundry, access to medical professionals, and more.

In 2023 Compass Housing helped connect over 3,514 people with mail, checks, and other correspondence.

Guest Reflection: Emergency Services

Like many who come through our doors, Ron was facing the daunting challenges of homelessness and was looking to take the next steps toward stability and growth.

He was battling to overcome his alcohol use disorder and was rejected by several programs in the city. But then, Ron found his way to the Compass Center. There, he met one of our case managers who connected him to a recovery program that provided the tools he needed for his journey to sobriety.

After successfully completing his recovery program, Ron returned to the Compass Center. This time, he was ready to embark on a new chapter in his life. With the assistance of our dedicated team, he was able to secure permanent supportive housing, a place he could finally call his own. Today, Ron not only has a stable home but also started his own business – a testament to the incredible potential that lies within each person when given the opportunity and support they deserve.

Yet, Ron's story doesn't end there. What makes his journey even more extraordinary is that he continues to keep his mailing address in our mail program. Why? Because this address, our Compass Center, grounds him and helps him remember where his transformation began. It reminds him of the incredible journey he undertook, the support he received, and the hope he found here.

In Providing **Emergency** Shelter

Compass Housing Alliance operates three enhanced emergency shelters throughout King County, offering vital support and safety for individuals experiencing homelessness. Our current shelters include:

- Blaine Veterans Center
 Enhanced Shelter: 36 beds for male-identifying Veterans with comprehensive support services.
- Otto's Place: 155 sleeping spaces, including 22 for Veterans, with extensive support services.
- Jan & Peter's Place Women's Shelter: 31 beds for female-identifying individuals

Serving Our Residents

Our enhanced emergency shelter model removes several barriers for people transitioning off the street by partnering overnight shelter with 24/7 on-site support services and intensive case management including housing navigation services.



Blaine Veterans Center Enhanced Shelter:

36 shelter beds separated by 3 short walls for male-identifying Veterans ages 18 and older.

24-hour access to a safe space and supports.

3 meals a day, laundry services, showers/hygiene, bus tickets for appointments, limited personal storage, kitchenette, computer & TV Smooth and safe operations with round-the-clock staffing.

On-site housing navigation support, Compass case management services, King County Collaborative Case Management Program services, and skill development opportunities.



Otto's Place

Otto's Place is an enhanced shelter program for male-identifying individuals. 155 personal sleeping spaces for individuals 18 and over. 24-hour access to safe spaces and support. On-site housing navigation and skill development opportunities.

Jan & Peter's Place Women's Shelter

Jan & Peter's Place Women's Shelter provides a safe, warm place to sleep each night for 31 homeless women. Previously known as Hammond House, Jan & Peter's Place has expanded its services as a 24/7 Enhanced Shelter program.


Access to Jan & Peter's Place is by referral only through the City of Seattle's HOPE team.

Guest testimony Emergency Shelter

Robert was renting a room in Bothell for a long time, but due to rapidly deteriorating health issues, he lost his ability to work. He soon lost his housing because his building was struck with COVID. As a person with a compromised immune system, he couldn't stay there even if he wanted to.

"If I ever slept outside, even for a night, I would die," he said.

He didn't know what he was going to do until he talked to a good friend, Pastor Rick, who told Robert about Compass and what we might be able to do for him.

"First I went down to the 77 Washington," he said. "I was there for a long time as I'm not the easiest person to work with. But the people at Compass were always patient with me."

Compass staff never stopped looking for placements that would serve Robert better and he eventually landed at the Blaine Center near the Space Needle. Blaine Center is a 24/7 enhanced emergency shelter program that focuses on permanent housing placement for its guests (as all our enhanced shelters do).

"The case manager I worked with, Anthony, never gave up on me," Robert said. "An apartment opened at Nyer Urness House and I jumped on it, but I got really sick and got hospitalized. Once I got back, Compass staff picked it up from there and kept helping me. I have a lot of challenges, you know. I couldn't work, I had physical disabilities. It looked really dire for me, but those guys kept going and kept trying."

In Providing Housing

Compass Housing Alliance provides permanent supportive and affordable housing options throughout King County. Our properties cater to income-eligible families and individuals, offering a range of housing solutions including independent living for seniors, supportive housing for formerly homeless individuals, and affordable apartments for low-income and working-class households. Our housing options include:

- Case management
- Connections to behavioral health and primary care support
- Independent living for seniors
- Affordable apartments for low-income and working-class

Creating One Less Barrier as we support residents

Makayla has two sons and worked at a restaurant before COVID shut it down. She looked for work right away but was having trouble finding anything. It has been a long road since. Makayla fell behind in rent while looking for work and caring for her children. Finding employment that worked around her skillset and her children's schedule proved to be difficult and stressful. At Compass Housing Alliance, we understand the many barriers that our families face, and we work to dismantle these barriers and reduce stressors as much as we can. A big part of that comes from our strong belief in building community.

We launched our One Less Barrier campaign to give families and individuals a fair chance at thriving by helping them eliminate past-due rent. This campaign supported families and individuals facing financial hardship and fueled Compass's vital work to end the cycle of homelessness in our community.

The fear of homelessness caused by financial insecurity and burgeoning debt carried the heaviest toll on their wellbeing. As a result, Compass decided to remove the rental debt burden as well as to work with residents on action plans, job search efforts, budgeting, and applying for benefits to help in other areas.

For many of our families, Compass is the only community they have known. Working together, we have continued to provide innovative new programs to address the changing needs of our community. Families just like Makayla's can be rest assured that we will always be on their side.








Financial Highlights
